Before the dance:

• Notify the Super Square Head, Stephanie Stevens, (408-871-9525) of any needed changes to assigned dates.

- On scheduled night, the designated Square Heads should arrive by **6:15** PM and stay until clean up is finished around 9:45 PM. A Katydids member with a key will open the doors and will secure the hall at end of evening.
- Check the restrooms for supplies & tidiness.
- Make coffee (located on Katydids' shelf in the storage room) and ice water using provided plastic cubes stored in plastic ziplock bags in the freezer.
- Sweep the floor as necessary & set up the sign-in table.
- Set up at least 32 chairs. Bring out more chairs as needed.
- Set up drinks and supplies on counter.
- After the first tip, place snacks, located on the Katydids' shelf in the kitchen, on the back table at back of the hall along with paper goods, sanitizer and flyers

During Club dance:

- Welcome everyone as they enter.
- Collect a \$5.00 donation from each guest and have them sign in. "Regular" guests sign the prepared sheet, new guests sign the guest book.
- In the green box, there is an envelope with petty cash for making change.
- Offer raffle tickets: 5 tickets for \$1.00.
- In the green box, there are envelopes for keeping track of money collected during the evening.
- Divide the raffle proceeds with 50% to the Club, 50% to the winner. (Note: odd dollar goes to the winner!)
- Check that coffee, water & cups do not run out during the evening.
- After announcements and raffle, feel free to dance except for the last tip (unless you are needed to fill a square) when you will need to be putting things away and cleaning up

After the dance:

- If Treasurer is not present, pass monies collected to any Executive Board Member.
- Pack up the sign-in table items, leftover snacks and flyers.
- Empty coffee pot and dry the cooler and pack up other supplies and return them to the shelf in storage room.
- Wipe counter and tables where needed.
- Empty garbage can if more than half full. The dumpster is located in the side parking lot.
- Sweep up crumbs from the floor as needed.
- Return extra chairs to the storage room
- Notify the Quartermaster, Lloyd (408-482-9320) of any replacement supplies needed for the next week.

A little something about OUR THEMES:

National Empanada Day is April 8 but we are recognizing this food holiday on April 12. Empanadas are a stuffed bread or pastry that is baked or fried. The name empanada comes from the Galician, Portuguese and Spanish verb *em pandar*, meaning to wrap or coat in bread. Empanadas are made by folding the dough or bread around a seasoned stuffing. The filling usually is made from meat, cheese, vegetables or fruits but may be made with other ingredients.

National Pretzel Day is April 26. The Pennsylvania Dutch immigrants introduced pretzels to North America in the 19th century. At this time, many handmade pretzel bakeries populated central Pennsylvania, and their popularity quickly spread. It was in the 20th century that soft pretzels were very popular in areas such as Philadelphia, Chicago and Today, the average Philadelphian New York. consumes about twelve times as many pretzels as the national average. Pennsylvania is the center of American pretzel production for both hard and soft pretzels, producing 80% of the nation's pretzels. The annual United States pretzel industry is worth over \$550 million. The average American consumes about 1.5 pounds of pretzels per year. Philadelphia opened a privately run "Pretzel Museum" in 1993. pretzels originated in the United States in 1850.

Cinco de Mayo, or the fifth of May, is a holiday that celebrates the date of the Mexican army's 1862 victory over France at the Battle of Puebla during the Franco-Mexican War. A relatively minor holiday in Mexico, in the United States Cinco de Mayo has evolved into a commemoration of Mexican culture and heritage, particularly in areas with large Mexican-American population.

I am thankful for all of those who said NO to me. It's because of them I'm doing it myself.









Southwest Florida at its best!

Have you ever visited the Everglades in Florida? Well I never had and it was on my bucket list as one of the most unusual places to visit in the US. When I checked the available trips through Road Scholar (RS), I found one in early February that a friend told me was the best time to visit that area because there were no mosquitos and not much rain. Sounded good to me, so I booked it, and headed out. This was my first Road Scholar trip and they are wonderful! If you have never traveled with them, find a place to go and sign up!


Before meeting up with the RS group I spent the weekend with friends in a small village southeast of Tampa, called Ave Maria. Ave Maria was a pet project of the Catholic philanthropist, Tom Monaghan, founder of Domino's Pizza, who wanted to have a Catholic university in south Florida as well as a town around it with a K-12 school and eventually a nursing school. You don't have to be Catholic to live or own property there either. My friends moved into the Del Webb development there about 4 years ago and they love it, in spite of the mosquitos and rainy, hot summers. With them we went on an airboat ride through the mangrove swamps, visited the local farmer's market which has gorgeous displays of the



local produce, including oranges and tomatoes, had lunch at an old-time ritzy restaurant where the rich and famous used to dine, and took a trolley ride through the very well-to-do town of Naples founded in the 1920s by poor Italian fisherman who are now VERY wealthy. A very desirous <u>lot</u> in the most elegant part of town recently sold for \$200,000,000!!! I saw a 1500 sq. ft. "starter" home built in the 60's that is on the market for \$7.1 million—probably sold originally for \$30,000 or less! And we think there is horrible inflation here!

Once the tour with Road Scholar got started we were treated to several lectures about the area and the problems that have been faced historically, and well as those they are facing now. The big problems there are how to contain the vast amounts of rain fall that threaten to flood areas that have been developed now from areas that were part of the natural water shed.

Floridians are learning the hard way that you shouldn't fool with Mother Nature. However they have many projects driven by conservationists that are gradually solving the majority of these problems. To introduce us to these efforts, Road Scholar had us visit the Corkscrew Swamp nature trail where we had a guided tour on a raised boardwalk area. We saw areas that must be exposed to fire on a regular basis—as Mother Nature used to do, we saw park lands that differed only one foot in elevation from cypress swamps, and we saw "airplants" that grow huge long root systems



Over the next few days we visited various State and National Parks to see and hear more about the beauties of the land and the safety of the animals. And Yes! We did see lots of alligators in the wild. However they are decreasing in numbers more rapidly than nature would have imagined due to the introduction of the Burmese Python, which came to this area within the last 10-15 years originally as pets, that people bought when they were less than 4 feet long. But when they grew to more than 12 feet long, people just released them into the wild, not realizing that they lay clutches of more than 80 eggs at a time. They have no known predators, except the bigger alligators who do eat the eggs and immature snakes. But a full-grown Burmese Python can take on a full-grown alligator and kill it. Attempts to control their population have been somewhat successful by capturing, tagging and rereleasing adult male pythons that lead scientists to the "nurseries" where the eggs are systematically destroyed.

The most worthwhile project that we got to visit was the Nature Conservancy of South Florida, located in Naples, and originally completely funded by the people of Naples. Here they have a very large teaching center for students of all ages to learn about and research the whole environment of the Everglades. They have classrooms for elementary age students with state of the art classrooms, software, hands-on displays, college level research staff and forward looking projects. They have a fully functioning animal hospital that treats any animal that people bring in—

including Burmese Pythons. They have huge flight cages for larger birds that are recovering from injuries, and a theatre/ auditorium where they have



v a r i o u s presentations for not only scientists who come here from all over the world, but for the local citizens of that area. All this is run through a foundation that gets operating funds from local grants, contributions, and state and national funding for their projects.


There are hundreds of hours of volunteer labor that is supplied by the local towns people, many of whom are retired scientists.

Road Scholar's excellent reputation in finding exciting places and creating well-run trips with excellent, knowledgeable guides; good food; and comfortable, close-by lodging was definitely upheld by this trip. Other members of the group were friendly and fun to be with—and I came home with several new friends.
