Before the dance:

- Notify the Acting Super Square Head, Lloyd Darknell, at (408) 482-9320, of any needed change of duty assignment dates.
- Purchase and bring 6-8 lbs ice for the water cooler.
- On scheduled night, the designated Square Heads should arrive by 6:30 PM.
- Set up tables and chairs as needed. Note: Chairs should be set up in a horseshoe shape with an opening at the back for access to food & drinks.
- Make ice water.
- · Start hot water for tea and coffee.
- * Attach special signs to recycle containers.

During Club dance:

- Welcome everyone at the sign-in table.
- Offer raffle tickets, 5 tickets for \$1.00.
- Have guests sign guest book and collect a \$4.00 donation per guest and 'angels'.
- Give guest names to President or Membership Chair for introduction during announcements.
- Divide the raffle proceeds 50% to the Club, 50% to one single "prize" cup.
- · Check that water and cups do not run out.
- If Treasurer is not present, pass monies collected to any Executive Board Member.

After the dance -

• ALL MEMBERS: Clean up!! Help pack up supplies and jugs and put into the Club Cupboard. Remove non-recyclable trash accidentally tossed into the designated recycle bins. Take the trash bags out to the dumpster located in the side parking lot.

NOTE: tables must go into closet FIRST (remember the Caller's table, too), then the chair "rack".

- Remove signs from recycle containers and put into cupboard.
- Notify the Super Square Head of any supplies that are needed.

From the Kitchen of Pat Angotti --

DUMP CAKE

1 can (20 oz) crushed pineapple with juice; undrained 1 can (21 oz) cherry pie filling

1 pkg Duncan Hines Moist Deluxe Yellow Cake Mix 1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

1/2 cup butter or margarine, cut into thin slices

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease 13x9 pan.
- 2. Dump pineapple with juice into prepared pan. Spread evenly. Dump in pie filling. Spread evenly. Sprinkle cake mix evenly over cherry layer. Sprinkle pecans over cake mix. Dot with butter. Bake at 350 degrees F for 50 minutes or until top is lightly browned. Serve warm or at room temperature.

Hello, friends and family,

We slowed down a bit in November, spending most of the month in just one state – Arizona. Of course, it's a mighty big state!



Before we left Deming, NM. we took a loop drive to Silver City. Along the way, we drove by the Santa Rita Open-pit Copper Mine. No picture can

do justice to this immense man-made hole in the ground. That's a huge \$12M truck in the picture

Also on the return portion of the loop was City of Rocks State Park. This h u g e collection of rocks is sprawled over about 2 acres a high desert plain



that covers hundreds of square miles! The extinct mountain volcano that probably spewed out these boulders is over 20 miles away! Nice camping spots tucked among the rocks – for rigs smaller than ours.



November 6 we made it into Arizona for a weekend with the Old Pueblo Square Wheelers at Catalina State Park, just north of Tucson. We

always have a great time when we can meet up with one of the National Square Dance Campers Association chapters – and they're great cooks, too!



This was a double milestone for us! It marked the 48th state that we've had the RV in (we bought it in December of 2003). It was also the 50th state that we've square danced in, since taking our lessons with Bows &

Beaus and the Katydids in California back in 2000. (We've danced at 162 unique events to 221 unique callers, at 3 "Nationals", a NSDCA National, in 4 Canadian provinces and 3 other countries during that time! MX, UK, Germany)

We doubled back to Benson to see the SKP park there, find some old friends and make some new ones. It's a really nice park set up with quite a few social activities. They have some great sunsets, too!





While there, we drove to Bisbee and walked around the "old town". Lots of interesting shops and houses tucked around the rock outcroppings – some good ice cream, too.

We also stopped in Tombstone and had several hours of fun. A bit touristy but we still enjoyed ourselves and learned some new things. The exhibit at the Tombstone Epitaph newspaper was very interesting.





We headed north to Casa Grande, where we visited the SKP park there but stayed at the Western Horizon park. Lots of activities, good food and a heated pool with hot tub. Easy place to spend a week.

We ended the month crossing over to Desert Hot Springs in Calif. Another very nice Western Horizon

shapes. There are lots of easy trails in the park and we did lots of wandering around. It's hard to believe that settlers tried to scratch out a living in places like this. Makes one wonder just how bad the situation they left was if it was worth trying to sustain a family in these parts! We also took a drive south around the Salton Sea. We missed seeing "the slabs", which we heard about later. This is an area of an abandoned military base where squatters have taken over and transient **RVers** frequently visit – it's apparently quite a conglomeration of living abodes, shacks to Prevosts (million dollar motor coaches). Another



item on the list for next time. We did however stop to picnic in Calipatria and found this flag pole – purportedly the tallest in the country. To make it even more interesting, the TOP of the flagpole is at sea level! That put our picnic table at 184 feet BELOW sea level.

We still have another week (till April 8) of sea, sun and sand in Mexico (at Kino Bay), so the internet connection comes and goes. The phones are turned off while we're here but you can still reach us by e-mail – occasionally – at marymonti@aol.com
